Message from Rev'd Mpole Masemola

Growing in Thankfulness

"Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well". These are Jesus' words to the Samaritan man who came back to thank him after noticing his skin disease had been healed after an encounter with Jesus in Luke 17:11-19. Ten were healed, but only one came back to express his gratitude. This gratitude is what marked him as different from the others.

Gratitude has a way of nurturing relationships, a way of making us well through making our relationships well, including our relationship with God. It does not grow only from abundance or receiving good things but from noticing God's care in our daily lives: the day's light, a friend's call, a shared meal, a challenge faced with grace. When we name these gifts, we invite God to deepen our faith and widen our hearts toward others and MAKES US WELL! Have you noticed how the Eucharist – the Great Thanksgiving – is important to our Anglican way of life? Our parish grows in thankfulness as we gather for worship, offer prayers of praise, break the bread and share the wine, sing together, and witness to God's faithfulness in word and deed.

May I suggest the following ways to grow in gratitude this week:

- Start and end each day with a brief thank-you prayer each morning.
- Keep a score of daily blessings big or small in a notebook or your favourite notetaking phone app.
- Tell someone how their kindness is a blessing to you.
- In worship, silently name one gift you're grateful for in intercession.

May the example of the thankful Samaritan sharpen our insight and soften our hearts, that we might live more fully as grateful followers of Christ.

A Father to the Fatherless

'Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world'. (James 1:27)

We are surrounded by people in need, but sometimes we do not see them. When someone is widowed, they need the care of their friends, not only in the first week, but in the months and perhaps years that follow. This may involve practical care such as meals and advice and even housing and financial support. People who are connected to the prison system are also especially vulnerable, whether they are prisoners, or the family of those in gaol. I had a friend who looked after people in the weeks after their release, when they were trying to re-establish their lives. This was an important ministry. The care of 'orphans and widows' reflects the nature of the God we worship who cares for the fatherless and the orphaned (*Psalm 68:5*).

Question for thought: Do I have the eyes of love for those in special need?

Heavenly Father, we bring before you the Mothers Union family in the Union of Episcopal Anglican Women of Brazil. Give them wisdom as they reach out to others in your name and help to transform communities, giving practical support to victims of domestic violence, immigrants and the elderly. Amen.
